Civil War Stone Installed in Davis City

On November 7th, 2023, Iowa SAR volunteers became aware of the death of Jacob Zimmerman of Davis City, Iowa. On December 14th, 2023, a 180 pound granite marker was installed on his grave. What makes this a bit different is that Zimmerman was a veteran of the Civil War and had died 122 years ago.

Iowa SAR member Mike Rowley, who is also Camp Commander of Grenville M. Dodge Camp #75, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, was first contacted by Robert Seitz, a great-grandson of Jacob Zimmerman, to see if the grave might be marked after all these years. After obtaining the required documentation and getting approval from city officials and the VA, the mission was accomplished.

The volunteers hope that these headstones not only honor the veterans and their service, but that they also serve as a sign for all living veterans and their families that their sacrifices will alway be remembered.

Wreaths Across America at Rock Island National Cemetery

On December 16th, 2023, Iowa SAR member Justin Blood participated in Wreaths Across America at Rock Island National Cemetery. He was among several hundred people who braved the rain and 44 degree temperatures to honor veterans buried there. Volunteers placed 3,600 wreaths on veteran graves.

Justin, dressed in his Revolutionary War uniform, was interviewed by Thomas Geyer of the Quad-City Times. During the interview, Justin identified himself as a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and expressed his desire to show respect for the soldiers.

The main speaker for the event was Major General Jeffrey W. Jurasek, First Army Deputy Commanding General (Support). Justin met several service men and women at the event. After the picture at right was taken, one of the Vietnam Veterans (far right) handed Justin a commemorative Vietnam Veterans coin. As Justin puts it, the moment "hit me hard in the tear ducts." It was a great experience!

A Popular Tale... and "the Rest of the Story"



There is a story that gets passed around this time of year. While the story is one that you should hear, there is more to the story than most people ever hear. As Paul Harvey, the popular radio host, used to say, "Here is the (long pause) rest of the story."

Captain John Duthie Sydney Phillips, of the passenger steamer SS Warrimoo, had an idea on December 30th, 1899 to achieve historical notoriety. It was not unusual for a ship's captain to travel out of their way to cross the equator on the date line. This was called achieving a "golden shellback." By directing his crew carefully, Captain Phillips hoped to better even this!

Through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia, the Warrimoo's position was charted by five experienced navigators using the sun and at night with the stars every three hours. Gradually the ship's position became LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was December 31st , 1899. Checking and double checking the ship's position, Captain Phillips adjusted the engine speed. At midnight the SS Warrimoo, according to his data, lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line

The consequences of this bizarre position were many: The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere in the middle of summer. The rear (stern) was in the Northern Hemisphere in the middle of winter. The date in the aft part of the ship was December 31st, 1899. In the bow (forward) part it was listed as January 1st, 1900.



This ship would therefore not only be in:

Two different days.

Two different months,

Two different years,

Two different seasons,

But in two different centuries all at the same time! (1)

Here's where Paul Harvey and..."the rest of the story" comes in. Other than the ship's log, which was recounted to a reporter of the Ottumwa (Canada) Journal by Captain Phillips in 1942, nothing was reported at the time. This, however, was probably where the story began. (2)

It may be that the captain and the crew believed that they had accomplished this feat. Modern scientists, however, seriously doubt that the state of technological equipment at the time was accurate enough to fix the ship's exact location. (3)

More recent history really destroys the story. As many of us remember the Y2K mess years ago, a century ends only when the year ending in zero is over. The 21st century (third millennium) started on January 1, 2001 just like the 20th century began on January 1, 1901, not 1900. (3)

Perhaps the most famous passenger ever to sail on the SS Warrimoo was Mark Twain. There is an often seen picture of him leaning back in a deck chair that is believed to have been taken in 1895. Twain could hardly have imagined that this same ship would inspire a legend.
