The dedication represents dozens of hours by our members and hopefully will result in the delivery, installation and grave marking by Memorial Day 2025.


Dr. Sunleaf Serves as Keynote Speaker

On February 22, Dr. Arthur Sunleaf served as the keynote speaker at the Lawrence Van Hook Chapter, NSDAR Good Citizens Tea at the DeWitt Public Library in Dewitt, IA..

He spoke about two simple yet at times complex concepts. The first was servant

leadership and the second one was kindness. Bishop Dale Bronner, senior pastor of Word of Faith Family Worship Cathedral in Atlanta, GA says, "If service is beneath you, leadership is beyond you."

A "servant leader" is often used to describe a leadership style that prioritizes serving others and creating an environment where people find success. A Most Treasured Record of the Iowa Society—A Decision to Be Made


For members of the Iowa Society of the American Revolution and their families, "hidden history" needed to complete a story is found in the large IASSAR membership books.

These volumes contain transcribed member application data since the beginning of the

organization on **September 5, 1893**. Every member from #1 Henry Boardman to number 2557 has been meticulously entered in the handwriting of the existing secretary. [SAR Secretary Doug Frazer with one volume]

Now after 132 years, Volume 2 is nearly full. The decision before the current IASSAR leadership is whether we continue this time-honored tradition by purchasing a similar custom bound book to enter the names for the next 50 years or does the tradition end with us?

The books are roughly 15" x 18", leather bound, with A-Z index to allow the lookup of names, 250 pages of acid free archival quality paper, and pages requiring custom designed columns to accommodate the SAR data.



There are few craftsmen capable of producing such a book. As a result, early projections of cost are approximately \$1200. One could rationalize that for something to accommodate the next 50 years of

new members, it is not as price prohibitive as it seems at first glance. However, like those that came before us the decision and cost lies with us now. [Shown—Volume 1, Page 1]

At the next monthly Zoom meeting members will be asked to vote not only for those nominated for Board of Managers elected offices but also to consider this expense.

Gold Star Mother's Day to Gold Star Mothers' and Family Day

I am old enough to recall seeing Blue Stars in many windows of homes in my neighborhood. Does anyone else recall seeing the stars in the windows? I don't recall seeing any Gold Stars, which is very fortunate for many military families at the time. What is the Blue Star or Gold Stars being referred to?

The original display was service flags and arm bands worn by families about the time of WWI to identify those having family members serving during the war. This transformed into the Blue Star being displayed in the windows of the homes of those serving. The Gold Star signified the family had experienced the loss of a family member while serving during the war.

- In 1928, twenty-five women that had lost a child serving during the war effort created the American Gold Star Mothers, Inc. which still exists.
- Gold Star Mother's Day began in 1936 designating the last Sunday in September.
- The Gold Star lapel button came into being in 1947. It was to formally recognize service members who lost their lives in combat.

- Gold Star Spouses Day is observed on April 5th
- The Gold Star next of kin lapel button was created in 1973 to symbolize active-duty service members who lost their lives in non-combat operations.
- The Gold Star Wives Day took place in 2010 and two years later (2012) the senate approved April 5th each year as the Gold Star Wives Day.
- In 2015 President Obama amended the "Gold Star Mothers' Day to include families and designated it as "Gold Star Mothers' and Family Day" too be celebrated on the last Sunday of September.

Let's all acknowledge and celebrate the Gold Star Spouses Day this month.

Put it on our calendars to celebrate again the last Sunday of September!
